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Учебно-практическое пособие состоит из 14 уроков, объединяющих по 2-3 главы из произведения Ника Хорнби «Мой мальчик». Цель обучения – развить у учащихся навык чтения на английском языке, расширить их словарный запас, усовершенствовать навыки критического мышления и творческого письма, монологической и диалогической речи. К каждому из блоков приводится список лексики, за которым следуют упражнения на закрепление лексических единиц, а также упражнения на проверку понимания текста, интерпретацию основных мотивов произведения и задания на перевод художественного текста.

Учебно-практическое пособие предназначено для бакалавров факультета иностранных языков, обучающихся по направлению 44.03.05 «Педагогическое образование с двумя профилями подготовки», направленность «Английский язык. Иностранный язык». Пособие подготовлено в соответствии с требованиями Федерального государственного образовательного стандарта высшего образования и обеспечивает усвоение студентами комплекса компетенций, предусмотренных дисциплиной «Домашнее чтение на английском языке».

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#### **ВВЕДЕНИЕ**

Предлагаемое вашему вниманию учебно-практическое пособие представляет собой курс домашнего чтения на английском языке, предназначенный для студентов 4 курса факультета иностранных языков, обучающихся по направлению 44.03.05 «Педагогическое образование с двумя профилями подготовки», направленность «Английский язык. Иностранный язык». Оно может быть успешно использовано студентами неязыковых факультетов, а также широким кругом лиц, изучающих английский язык самостоятельно. Цель пособия – познакомить студентов с произведением современной английской литературы, расширить их словарный запас, развить навыки говорения, критического мышления, а также навыки художественного перевода. При составлении пособия использовался традиционный подход, при этом анализируемое произведение затрагивает действительно актуальные проблемы личности и общества, представляющие большой интерес для изучения и обсуждения и способствующие разностороннему развитию личности обучаемых.

Пособие состоит из 14 уроков и заданий к ним. К каждому из уроков составлен список ключевых слов и выражений, незнание которых может вызывать затруднения в понимании текста. Большое количество упражнений на отработку ключевой лексики позволяет значительно обогатить словарный запас студентов. Следующие за ними коммуникативно-ориентированные задания дают возможность вывести в речь изученные лексические единицы и развить навыки и умения спонтанного высказывания. Также пособие включает задания на развитие навыков письменной речи.

Основные виды лексических упражнений следующие: соотнесение лексических единиц с их определениями, определение особенностей образования слов, заполнение пропусков подходящими лексическими единицами, восстановление

пропущенных предлогов и частиц фразовых глаголов, соотнесение частей предложений, восстановление пропущенных фрагментов текста, составление предложений с изучаемыми лексическими единицами. Основные виды упражнений на понимание текста следующие: ответы на вопросы по содержанию текста, определение авторства прямой речи героев и восстановление контекста высказывания, обсуждение вопросов, раскрывающих смысл произведения, мотивы героев и посыл автора, упражнения на перевод.

Таким образом, основными задачами пособия являются:

- ✓ формирование интереса к чтению на английском языке;
- ✓ углубление знаний в области культуры стран изучаемого языка;
- ✓ обучение началам литературного анализа текста;
- ✓ расширение словарного запаса за счет лексических единиц и устойчивых словосочетаний текстов;
  - ✓ развитие монологической и диалогической речи;
  - ✓ развитие критического мышления;
  - ✓ формирование навыка художественного перевода;
  - ✓ формирование и развитие навыка самостоятельной работы с текстом.

Пособие подготовлено в соответствии с требованиями Федерального государственного образовательного стандарта высшего образования и развивает требуемые компетенции.

There were two words in particular that made him want to cover his ears with his hands; they always had done, and they always would, as long as his life revolved around Countdown and Home and Away and new Marks and Spencer sandwich combinations, and he could see no way in which he could avoid them in any conversation with Fiona about her depression. Those two words were 'the point'. As in, 'What's the point?'; 'I don't see the point'; 'there's just no point' (a phrase which omits the 'the', but one that counts anyway, because the 'the' wasn't the point of 'the point', really)... You couldn't have a talk about life, and especially about the possibility of ending it, without bringing up the fucking point, and Will just couldn't see one. Sometimes that was OK; sometimes you could be bombed out of your head on magic mushrooms at two in the morning, and some arsehole lying on the floor with his head

jammed up against the speakers would want to talk about the point, and you could simply say, 'There isn't one, so shut up.' But you couldn't say that to someone who was so unhappy and lost that they wanted to empty a whole bottle of pills down themselves and go to sleep for as long as it took. Telling someone like Fiona that there was no point was more or less the same as killing her off, and though Will hadn't always seen eye-to-eye with her, he could honestly say he had no desire to murder her.

People like Fiona really pissed him off. They ruined it for everyone. It wasn't easy, floating on the surface of everything: it took skill and nerve, and when people told you that they were thinking of taking their own life, you could feel yourself being dragged under with them. Keeping your head above water was what it was all about, Will reckoned. That was what it was all about for everyone, but those who had reasons for living, jobs and relationships and pets, their heads were a long way from the surface anyway. They were wading in the shallow end, and only a bizarre accident, a freak wave from the wave machine, was going to sink them. But Will was struggling. He was way out of his depth, and he had cramp, probably because he'd gone in too soon after his lunch, and there were all sorts of ways he could see himself being dragged up to the surface by some smoothy life-guard with blond hair and a washboard stomach, long after his lungs had filled with chlorinated water. He needed someone buoyant to hang on to; he certainly didn't need a dead weight like Fiona. He was very sorry, but that was the way things were. And that was the thing about Rachel: she was buoyant. She could keep him afloat. He went to see Rachel.


